About your vaccination against

measles, mumps, and rubella (German measles)



Measles, mumps and rubella are three diseases that can make you seriously ill. Vaccines provide good protection against these diseases.

A person who has **measles** develops a high fever, a cough and a rash on the body, and they might become very ill.

Mumps causes the cheeks to swell. You can become very ill.

Rubella causes a fever and a rash. If a person catches mumps during pregnancy, their is a risk that their baby will be born with serious problems.

All three diseases spread easily between people, meaning others can also become ill.

If many people are vaccinated, fewer people will become ill

If you are vaccinated against measles, mumps and rubella, you are protected against becoming ill and infecting others. If many people are vaccinated and no one becomes infected anymore, we can make these diseases disappear completely.

The vaccine against measles, mumps and rubella is given twice: once at the child health centre and once at school.

All vaccines that you receive through the child and school healthcare services are voluntary and free of charge.

bring an adult along with you to

The vaccination

The school nurse will inject the vaccine into your upper arm.

After the vaccination

Most people feel nothing after their vaccination, or perhaps they will have a little soreness around the injection site.

Some people may develop a fever and their arm muscles might ache. These symptoms are completely harmless and will pass in a few days. If you are worried about anything following your vaccination, you or your parents or guardians can contact your school nurse or healthcare provider.
